

The undersigned Commodore of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels on the Coast of Africa, takes leave to acquaint the Commissary Judges of the British and Portuguese Mixed Commission for the suppression of illegal traffic in Slaves, that there are on board His Majesty's Ship Tartar under his command fifty four male and three female Slaves, being the survivors of Sixty Male Slaves, and five female Slaves removed by the Commodore's order from the Portuguese Slave Vessel, ^{constant} named in the Margin, and captured as set forth in the Commodore's former declaration, being part of that Vessel's Cargo. Eight have died on the passage; - as most of the Slaves so removed were afflicted with Dysentery, and other diseases incidental to an African Slave. Hence, the number of deaths may not appear extraordinary.

The Commodore has therefore to desire that these Slaves may be landed forthwith in order to their passing thro' the
